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Grab your passport and some comfortable walking shoes because we are going to Lisbon! The Federation of Defense and Corporate Counsel (FDCC) invites you to the 2026 Annual Meeting in Lisbon, Portugal, hosted at the luxurious Corinthia Hotel, which was nominated for Leading Luxury Hotel, Leading City Hotel, and Leading Conference Hotel in 2025 by the World Travel Awards.

Registration is open. With room rates starting at €240.00 for a king per night, this is the opportunity to Make a Mosaic of Memories with your family and the FDCC.

We have designed an outstanding group of full and partial day excursions, which start on Monday, July 27, 2026. Plan to arrive early, both for the fellowship and the Best of the Best excursions, all of which are designed to introduce you to the history and authenticity of Lisbon and Portugal.

Our theme, "A Mosaic of Memories," is designed to celebrate Lisbon's vibrant tapestry of history, innovation, and tradition in one of Europe's most enchanting, authentic, and oldest cities. Awarded Europe's Leading City Designation, Best World Heritage City, and Best City Break Destination in 2024, Lisbon took a record 20 awards at the World Travel Awards in 2024. In addition, Portugal was just awarded Europe's 2025 Leading Destination in October 2025 by the World Travel Awards.

Our afternoon excursions will include rides on the trams, strolls through Alfama, Lisbon's oldest neighborhood, where Fado music echoes through narrow cobbled lanes and Roman ruins whisper stories of empires past, and strolls up the Avenida da Liberdade, a luxury shopper's paradise, to the trendy

Baixa and Príncipe Real. Absolutely do not miss the walking tour of Belém, where you will see the Jerónimos Monastery, a UNESCO World Heritage site that stands as a monument to Portugal's Golden Age of Exploration, and behold the iconic Belém Tower, which once guarded adventurers as they set sail into the unknown.

Our walking tour of Alfama will take you up the colorful, cobblestone streets of the oldest neighborhood in Lisbon to the breathtaking views from São Jorge Castle, a hilltop Moorish castle and royal residence dating back to the 11th century, with panoramic views of the city.

No trip to Lisbon is complete without tasting the legendary pastel de nata, served warm and creamy at the original Pastéis de Belém near the Monastery. You can find them on the corner of every cobblestone street, but they are best enjoyed warm, sitting down with coffee or tea at the original site next to the Monastery.

For a uniquely Portuguese cultural experience, we are offering an opportunity to visit the newly restored National Azulejo Museum. This beautiful museum, set in a former convent, showcases Portugal's famous painted tiles—and you will paint your own Azulejo ceramic tile in a workshop and take it home as a souvenir. We painted tiles while we were there for our site visit, and they came out really well! This is one of our best Lisbon memories.

Our full-day optional excursions will include full-day trips to Sintra, a storybook town with palaces, gardens, and UNESCO-listed charm, and Cascais, a coastal gem known for its beaches, boutiques, and relaxed ambiance.



The Corinthia Lisbon

The Corinthia Lisbon is a monument to the “Something Old, Something New” of Lisbon. The five star hotel is an oasis of luxury and a testament to the finest European service. Elegant and refined but completely updated and fresh, it nevertheless pays homage to the history of Lisbon, as many rooms offer a view of the centuries-old aqueduct, which still delivers fresh water to much of the city.

As you step through the hotel’s revolving door, whether from a long flight or a day of exploring the seven hills of Lisbon, you will enter a world of warmth and elegance. The service is friendly and efficient—and the expansive, marble-clad lobby, dressed in shades of cream and black, is welcoming. In a city where newly renovated hotel rooms are few, the Corinthia provides a fresh updated respite from the authenticity of a 3,000-year-old city. The World Travel Awards named the Corinthia Lisbon the World’s Leading City Hotel in 2018 and Portugal’s Leading Conference Hotel in 2024.

Our negotiated room rates for the Corinthia start at €240.00 for king rooms and €220.00 for single rooms, including VAT and any resort fees.

Once you have registered, you will be sent a link that will allow you to reserve a room in our discounted room block. Rooms are limited, and the block will fill up quickly, so please make your room reservations promptly. The Corinthia Lisbon is also Viking’s



chosen luxury hotel for its tours. Hat tip to our Sites Committee for finding the Corinthia before Viking discovered it, but this means that rooms outside of our room block may fill quickly. If you are interested in a suite or multiple rooms, we encourage you to register and book your rooms very soon. You cannot book a room until after you have registered for the convention. A first night’s room and tax deposit are required at the time of booking. Our room block and the preferred FDCC room rates are available until June 23, 2026 or until the block is full.

Check-in time is 3:00 PM, and check-out time is 12:00 PM. The hotel will do everything possible to accommodate early arrivals but cannot guarantee rooms before check-in at 3:00 PM. If you are arriving early and having a room immediately available is important, consider booking a room for the night before your arrival so that it is available promptly when you arrive in Lisbon.

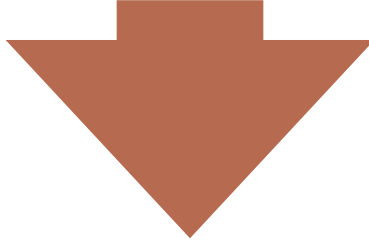

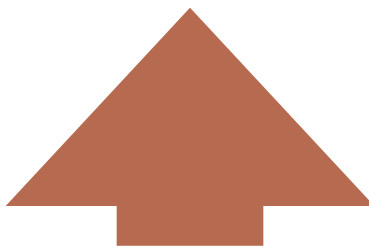

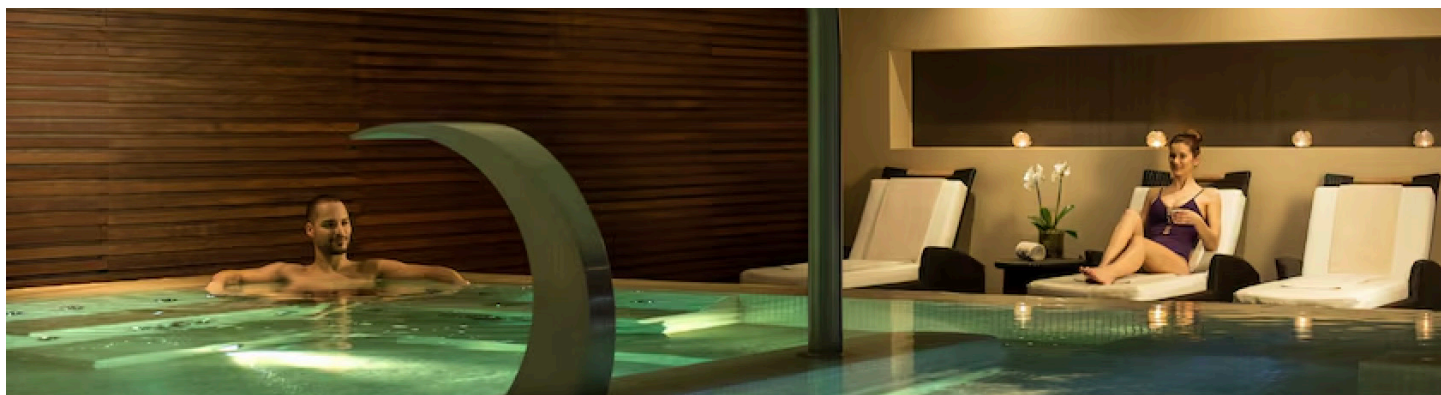

Corinthia Lisbon Amenities

FITNESS CENTER

Open to hotel guests 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. The gym is free of charge. The gym features equipment from the renowned Technogym brand. A personal trainer is available for personalized training sessions.

SHUTTLE SERVICE

Complimentary shuttle service will be provided to the City Center.

THE SPA

The Spa at the Corinthia Hotel is Portugal's finest five star spa, sweeping first place in all five international spa awards in 2024 and nominated for all five awards again in 2025. The Spa features 13 treatment rooms, a water therapy circuit with sensory showers, a dynamic pool, sauna, steam rooms, cold plunge, ice fountain, and a cooling walk. Be sure to make reservations in advance! The spa is open daily from 9:00 AM to 9:00 PM.

SWIMMING

Cool off in the luxurious indoor heated pool, which is open daily from 7:00 AM to 9:00 PM. Children under 16 must be accompanied by an adult. Swimsuits are mandatory at the pool and all water therapy activities. Yes, this is a given for us, but it is nice to know that others will be following the same guidelines.

WELLNESS STUDIO AT THE SPA

The spa features a wide variety of individual and group classes. In addition, the spa offers Novaphisio, which is a personalized rehabilitation wellness approach to enhance mobility and relieve pain through physiotherapy.

DINING AT THE CORINTHIA

Erva Restaurant & Bar

Contemporary Portuguese cuisine with authentic local flavors for lunch and dinner. Erva features an open kitchen with a wood-fired oven and cocktail bar. Most entrees range from €20-33 each, with starters an additional €8-15 euros. Open daily from 12:00 pm to 12:30 am.

Soul Garden Restaurant & Bar

Asian and Latin American fusion, with an electric, upbeat vibe. The menu includes dim sum, sushi, fish, and meats. We loved the pork ribs with hoisin sauce (€18), the amazing cauliflower tempura to share (€12), and the salada de laranja (€6).

Olivae Restaurant and Terrace

Authentic Mediterranean and Middle Eastern cuisine served among an olive tree-lined terrace. Most pasta and entrees range from €20-30, with starters and salads in the €12-20 range.

LAUNDRY AND DRY CLEANING

Services are available through the hotel.

SALON

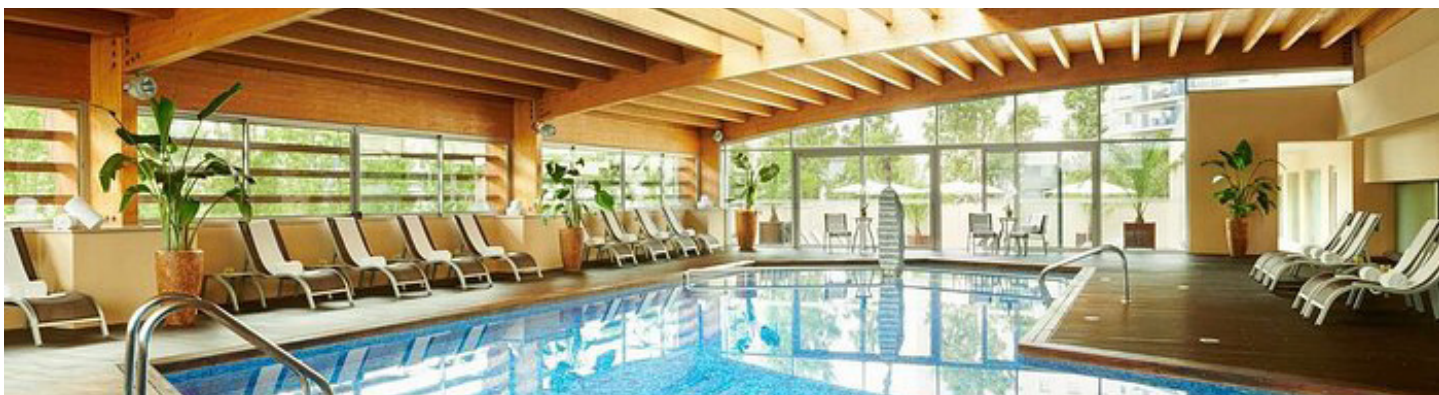
A full-service salon is available in the hotel. Appointments are required.

Available throughout the hotel and included in the hotel room rate.

Hair dryers are available in each guest room. USB charging ports are available in each guest room. You will need a two-prong converter for other electronics.



Conference Information

MEETING REGISTRATION

The early bird conference registration rate is \$1,995 for Defense Counsel members and \$850 for spouses or guests. The early bird registration ends on June 15, 2026. After that date, the rate is \$2,145 for Defense Counsel members and \$900 for guests.

For Corporate and Industry members, their spouses, significant others, and adult family members, the rate is \$850.

The rate for Emeritus Members and their guests is \$850.

The registration rates for children are tiered based on age. Children 3 and under are complimentary. Children 4 to 11 are \$260, children 12 to 17 are \$425, and children 18 to 20 are \$650.

We invite you to register online to guarantee your selection of afternoon activities. Visit the FDCC website for the online link. You may also use the “hard copy” registration form included with this brochure or that can be downloaded from the FDCC website. Registrations that are mailed will be processed in the order that they are received, and selected activities may not be available. Registrations may also be faxed or scanned and emailed with credit card payment. Registrations cannot be processed without payment, including for afternoon activities, and you are strongly encouraged to make your selections online with a credit card payment to ensure your choices are available. You will NOT be charged an additional credit card fee.

FDCC MEETING APP

Prior to the meeting, the FDCC will post information about the Meeting App for registrants to download and use to stay abreast of all developments and

announcements, to connect and communicate with members, and to share photographs. The full meeting schedule and locations of all meetings and events, including CLE, afternoon activities, and evening events, will be posted in the Meeting App and updated accordingly. Changes in activity times, new meeting locations, and announcements will be on the FDCC app, so check it regularly.

SPECIAL ACCOMMODATIONS

If you need any special accommodations, including special dietary restrictions/meals, ADA access, or other needs, please note them on your meeting registration or reach out to martha@thefederation.org at FDCC headquarters in advance of the meeting. Reasonable notice is requested.



ATTIRE

Dress for the business meetings will be business casual to casual. Attire for the President’s Celebration will be a suit or sport coat and tie for men and cocktail attire for women. Be sure to pack casual clothes for your afternoon excursions and dine-around evenings, and plenty of active wear for hiking, biking, or exploring. The hotel has a lovely indoor pool, and we are offering an optional beach excursion, so pack accordingly. Once the sun goes down, things could

theoretically cool off a bit, so bring a light jacket or sweater with you just in case!

We will have no theme party, but the final Gala will have an energetic vibe, with fun, upbeat music. Wear bright colors if you have them, but if not, wear black, and we will provide you with some color!

If I say this once, I will say it ten times: bring flat, comfortable shoes. For those who know me and have rarely seen me in flat shoes, trust me when I say that Lisbon is a flat shoe kind of place. The beautiful, iconic tiles that line every street, alley, and square in Portugal are slick and uneven, even when dry. Your trip will be more enjoyable if you bring and wear flat shoes.

CHILD CARE

The FDCC will have special, age-appropriate programming for teens and children during the Presidential Celebration on Wednesday and the Gala on Friday. Pre-registration is required. Children must be at least 3 years old and fully potty-trained to participate.

Teens and children are welcome to attend all other scheduled events.

If you desire childcare at any other time during the convention, we have a provider. Hourly rates start at €35.00 per hour for one child with a 3-hour minimum. Please note, however, that the FDCC does not endorse the childcare services or make any representations about their quality, standards, or fitness. Please use at your own risk.

SOLOS

If you are attending “solo,” let us know! The registration form will include an opportunity to indicate if you would like to be part of any “solo” plans, including the FDCC Dine with Friends night. Once onsite, we will have opportunities for you to get together with other solo attendees - whether this is your first meeting or your 10th!

2026 CHARM PORTUGUESE ROOSTER

The FDCC started selecting gold charms to commemorate its meetings in 1960. Over the years, our tradition has been to select a charm that will bring to mind fond memories of the venue or theme of the meeting. Charms are specially ordered, so please be sure to purchase your charm when you register. We cannot guarantee charms will be available if you do not pre-purchase.

Holly has chosen a rooster charm, which is a Portuguese good luck symbol representing faith, justice, and good fortune. It is a symbol of the Country's ability to find hope and prove truth even in the darkest or most difficult times. According to the legend of the Rooster of Barcelos, in the 15th century, a falsely accused pilgrim was condemned to hang, but he swore his innocence, stating that a roasted rooster on the judge's table would crow to prove it. Miraculously, the rooster crowed, proving the pilgrim's innocence and saving his life.



CANCELLATION POLICIES

Hotel Cancellations

All reservations are guaranteed with a deposit of the first night's reservation fee. Reservations may be cancelled on or before June 22, 2026. Reservations will be charged for the full reserved stay. The FDCC has no authority to modify the hotel's cancellation and refund policies.

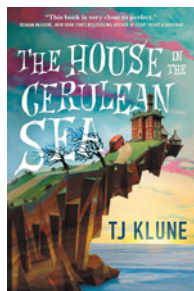
Convention Registration Cancellation Deadline

A refund of registration fees less \$85 and any applicable credit card fees will be given if the FDCC office receives written notice of cancellation no later than June 27, 2026. A refund of all registration fees, less \$250, will be made if the notice of cancellation is received by the Executive Director on or after June 28, 2026, but before July 13, 2026. A refund of all registration fees, less \$500, will be made if notice of cancellation is received by the Executive Director on or after July 13, 2026. Activity charges may be refunded if the vendor refunds fees or if another member fills and pays for the spot vacated by the cancellation. Any refunded activity fees will be settled following the conclusion of the meeting. It is highly recommended that all registrants purchase trip cancellation insurance.

We know that the Rooster will serve as a reminder of hope and truth, as it bestows good fortune on us and the FDCC in the years to come!

BOOK CLUB

The Book Club has chosen *The House in the Cerulean Sea* by TJ Klune as its book. The plot revolves around the experiences of Linus Baker, a mild-mannered caseworker entrusted with managing magical child orphanages in a world where humans and magical beings cohabitate. Linus gains insight into acceptance, empathy, and the real meaning of family by his interactions with a distinctive bunch of misfits. An enchanting story, masterfully told, *The House in the Cerulean Sea* is about the profound experience of discovering an unlikely family in an unexpected place—and realizing that family is yours.



FDCC ALCOHOL POLICY

The FDCC Alcohol Consumption Policy is that alcohol may be served at FDCC functions only to those attendees who are 21 years of age and older, regardless of the legal age in the various countries. In Portugal, minors aged 16 and over may purchase a glass of wine, beer, or cider to consume with a meal in a restaurant. You must be 18 to purchase or consume any other type of alcohol, including beer and wine. However, at all FDCC events, the FDCC Alcohol Consumption Policy will be in effect, which prohibits serving alcohol to those who are under the age of 21. FDCC members and/or guests who bring individuals to the Convention who are below the age of 21 will be expected to cooperate in the enforcement of this policy and to further assure that such underage individuals understand this policy.

The FDCC reserves the right to change the schedule, location, topics, speakers, and/or activities due to unforeseen circumstances.

NAME BADGES REQUIRED

Your FDCC name badge is required for all FDCC events, both on and off site. The name badges are color-coded as follows:

White FDCC members and family

Blue FDCC members - first-time attendees and family

Green FDCC members - second-time attendees and family

Yellow Non-FDCC member guests and family

Orange Guests under 21 years

WEATHER

July is Lisbon's sunniest and driest month, with average high temperatures of 82°F and lows of 64°F. Rain is very rare in July, with a 1-2% chance of rain for the entire month over the past five years. We are planning for bright, clear, sunny skies!

PASSPORT INFORMATION

Secure or check your passport now. Confirm that your passport does not expire within six months of your trip, as it may be considered invalid.

This is a good opportunity to apply for Global Entry (<https://ttp.dhs.gov/>) or download Mobile Passport Control (MPC), which is an app that will streamline your reentry to the United States. MPC is free and does not require a background check. It is not as quick or seamless as Global Entry, but is much faster than the standard line. Compare the two options with the [following link](#).



TIME

The time difference between New York and Lisbon is +5 hours.

CURRENCY

Portugal uses the **Euro**. Other forms of currency are not honored. Rick Steves recommends withdrawing euros upon arrival and using an actual bank instead of the airport ATM. If given the option, decline the conversion and withdraw the funds in euros. You will be able to use your credit card to get to the hotel. If you exchange cash for euros, you will lose another 5-10% during the exchange. When paying with a credit card, always choose to pay in euros, not dollars.

TIPPING

Tipping in Lisbon, and in Europe in general, differs from tipping in the States. For full-service restaurants, a tip of 5-10% is customary for exceptional service. For casual cafes, just round up to the nearest euro. For housekeeping, tipping is generally done daily instead of at the end of a stay and is in the range of 1-2 euros per day. Similarly, bellhops or porters are generally tipped 2-3 euros for several pieces of luggage. For an Uber driver, just round up to the next euro.

AIRPORT TRANSPORTATION

While costs vary depending on the market, our Uber cost €16 for one-way transportation from the airport to the hotel. Ubers are widely available and very quick. Public transportation is even less expensive.



PASSPORT SAFETY

Each guest room has a safe in which you should store your original passport, excess cash, health insurance cards, and other valuables. You should carry a copy of your passport with you throughout your trip.

VALUABLES

Consider leaving your valuable jewelry at home.

ELECTRICAL CURRENT

The electrical current in Lisbon is 230V at a 50Hz frequency. You will need a voltage converter and a plug adaptor. Most tech items (computers, cell phone chargers, etc.) will work with both US (110V) and Portuguese current, but you will need an adaptor so the U-shaped plug will fit into the European socket.

ADAPTOR

Portugal uses a two-prong adaptor (type F). Bring at least one. They are widely available on Amazon. Many even include USB and USB-C ports. You can purchase two Tessan adaptors with USB and USB-C ports on Amazon for \$24.

PORTABLE CHARGER

Purchase and bring a portable charger for your mobile phone. They are widely available on Amazon.

CAR RENTAL

We recommend against renting a car in Lisbon. Public transportation is easy to navigate, reliable, and very inexpensive. In addition, Ubers and Lyfts are widely available and also inexpensive by U.S. standards.

We will depart the hotel at 9:00 AM and travel first to the iconic, brightly colored Pena Palace, known for its fairytale architecture and lush gardens perched atop Sintra Mountain. The palace is a mixture of Gothic, Manueline, Islamic, and Renaissance influences and features spectacular views. With its vibrant colors, eclectic design, and panoramic views stretching to the Atlantic, it is one of Portugal's most iconic landmarks.

Experience two of our favorite activities in one day. Step into a working ceramics studio in the heart of Lisbon, where we will learn centuries-old techniques of Portuguese tile craftsmanship. Then prepare to unleash your creativity as you paint, glaze, and design your very own Portuguese azulejo tile in a charming artisan studio. You will finish with a souvenir bursting with color and culture.

After lunch, we will experience one of Portugal's sweetest traditions with our Pastel de Nata Pastry Class at Cooking Lisbon. In this hands-on workshop, you'll learn the secrets behind Lisbon's most iconic custard tart—from kneading the flaky puff pastry to whisking the rich, creamy filling that makes this treat

so irresistible. Guided by our expert local chefs, you will learn traditional techniques passed down through generations and discover why the pastel de nata has become a symbol of Portuguese hospitality.

At the end of the class, relax with a cup of espresso or port wine and take home (or eat) your freshly baked creations—along with a printed recipe—so you can recreate a taste of Lisbon wherever you go.

These are usually called “couvert.” The snacks are not free, but are usually a few euros at most. If you want to eat them, eat them. If you don't – push them to the side and ask they be taken away. Most of these snacks are 50c to €3.

Many tascas are only open for lunch during the week, so check the opening hours before assuming they will

be open. It's best to carry cash, as many don't accept credit cards (or only accept local Portuguese cards).

Explore Museums On Your Own



National Azulejo Museum The recently renovated National Azulejo Museum is housed on once-sacred grounds, in a former convent. Azulejos, or glazed tiles, are a craft that has long played a role in Portugal's cultural history. The museum delves into the rich legacy of the tiles, wooing visitors by their beautifully ornate patterns. The museum weaves more than 300 pieces in a decorative storytelling that traces the evolution of the azulejo from 16th-century handicraft to modern-day showstopper. In addition, the building itself—site of the former Madre de Deus Convent, founded in 1509—is a marvel in its own right. Do not miss the Chapel! This museum is closed for renovations during the first part of 2026. We are hopeful that the renovations will be completed by July!

Caluouste Gulbenkian Museum This Museum is a 10–15-minute walk from the Hotel and comes highly recommended for all ages. With that said, it has been under renovation on both of our site visits. Located in the northern edge of Lisbon, tranquil gardens surround a building that houses world-class pieces spanning 5,000 years of history—think Egyptian sculptures, John Singer Sargent paintings, and Art Nouveau jewelry. The

museum added sculptures around the garden, and it's great to split the visit up between the indoor galleries with a stroll around the grounds.

MAAT (Museum of Art, Architecture and Technology)

The museum is housed in a majestic riverside space in the heart of the riverfront in Belem. The futuristic structure by British architect Amanda Levete is unlike anything you'll find in Portugal. The permanent collection and the rotating exhibitions run the gamut, from pop art to ceramics to wood sculptures. It's also home to an impressive collection of contemporary Portuguese art. The space is beautiful. The architecture is unique, meaning exhibition spaces—which total 3,000 square meters—are different shapes, different sizes. Some are brightly lit with massive windows while others are darker and more intimate. The view from the top of the structure is just amazing. We have an afternoon tour of Belem that will include both the MAAT and its counterpart in the adjacent power station.

Museu da Electricidade (Electricity Factory) This museum is adjacent to MAAT and is in the former Central Tejo power station. The museum features an impressive permanent exhibit of an early 1900 era power station, and walks visitors through the use of coal and water to fuel the entire power grid in Lisbon. Fun Fact: it now serves as the power supply to the building. Very well done, with interactive stations at the end. The entire experience is great for children and tweens (and those of us who missed the entire electricity unit in high school science class).

Museu do Fado If you've been in Lisbon for a minute, you've heard Fado music somewhere—in a restaurant

or cafe, or a bar dedicated to the brooding tunes. It's one of Portugal's cultural legacies. Get to know the art form with an immersive experience at this Alfama museum: Photographs, posters, musical instruments, and other artifacts chart the rise of fado from its 19th-century roots to today. Look for José Malhoa's dreamy portrait *O Fado*, Constantino Fernandes' lively depiction of port life *O Marinheiro*, and an ode to the Portuguese guitar. If you are interested in this museum, you should reserve a guided tour in advance.

Museu Nacional De Arte Antiga
(National Museum of Ancient Art) The expansive collection features numerous gems like the gilded Belém Monstrance, brought back from India by Vasco da Gama; Hieronymus Bosch's haunting triptych "Temptations of St. Anthony," charting his turbulent path to salvation; and the bejeweled reliquary of Queen Leonor, originally intended to house the relic from Christ's Crown of Thorns. Spend time reveling in the building, a late-17th-century Lapa palace with baroque doorways.

Don't miss the Panels of St. Vincent, a 15th-century sextet of paintings by Nuno Gonçalves; the 16th-century ivory salt cellar that survived its journey from the West Coast of Africa to Portugal; and Albrecht Dürer's portrait of St. Jerome.

Berardo Collection Museum Located near the Jeronimos Monastery, the Berardo Collection Museum is the showstopper of the Belém Cultural Center. The modern and contemporary artworks on display here all belong to José Manuel Rodrigues Berardo, a billionaire entrepreneur and philanthropist. There is only room to display 900 of Berardo's pieces—by more than 500 artists—and they range from Minimalism and Conceptualism to Cubism and Surrealism. Roy Lichtenstein, Pablo Picasso, Marcel Duchamp, Francis Bacon, Jean-Michel Basquiat, Cindy Sherman, and Andy Warhol are all impressively represented.

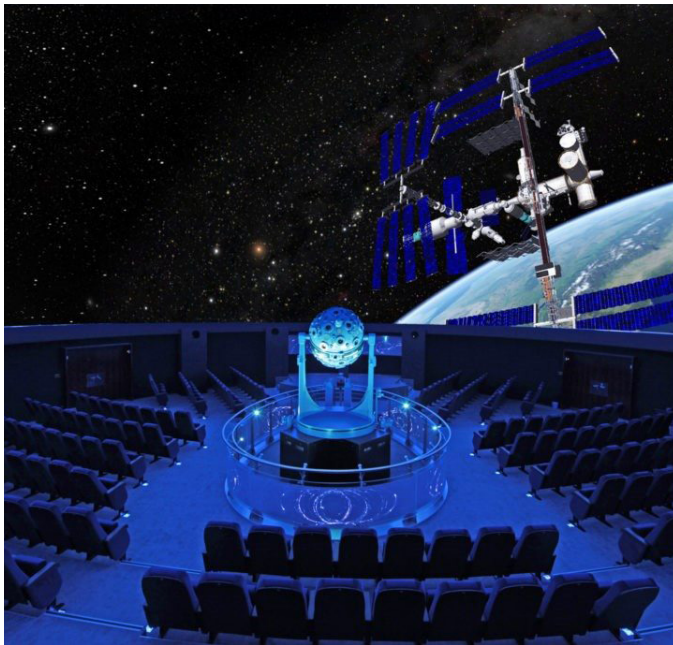


National Coach Museum Horse-drawn coaches get the limelight at the National Coach Museum in Belém. The historic collection, featuring examples from around the world, makes it one of Lisbon's most sought-after cultural sites. World, state, and promenade vehicles from the 16th to 19th centuries chronicle the evolution of coaches in the pre-automobile era. Peer at Queen Maria Francisca of Savoy-Nemour's circa-17th century ceremonial ride and the more modern 19th-century sedan chair, typically carried by footmen via leather straps. This museum was in the running as a site for the President's Reception and is definitely worth a visit if you are in Belem. We are including it on our tour of Belem, which we highly recommend.

The planetarium hosts engaging exhibitions in partnership with the Live Science Center, connecting the dots between ancient celestial navigation and modern space exploration.

Explore Churches, Chapels and Cathedrals

Lisbon Cathedral (Sé de Lisboa) The oldest church in Lisbon, established in 1147 after the city was taken from the Moors. Its sturdy, fortress-like Romanesque façade survived the 1755 earthquake, and it features a blend of architectural styles from different eras. Features include the cloister, a treasury/museum, the high choir, and strong historical significance. Don't miss the baroque nativity scene with over 500 figures, which is in a room behind the tomb of Queen Maria I.

Igreja de São Roque (Church of Saint Roch) This church proves that you cannot judge a book by its cover. Built by the Jesuits in the 16th century, the church's simple exterior hides one of the most lavishly decorated interiors in Lisbon. It is one of the few buildings to survive the earthquake. It features several ornate Baroque chapels, including the Chapel of St. John the Baptist, known for its incredible detail and use of rare materials. If you enjoy visiting beautiful churches, do not miss this one!

Igreja de São Domingos (Church of Saint Dominic)

Established in 1241, this was once the largest church in Lisbon. Inside, it looks damaged – and it is. Although it survived two major earthquakes, it was devastated by a fire in 1959. Although structural elements were restored, the effect of the fire was left on the columns and many of the walls.

Igreja de Santa Engrácia / Panteão Nacional (National Pantheon)

Originally intended as Igreja de Santa Engrácia, its construction began in the 17th century but took centuries to complete. It was later converted into the National Pantheon of Portugal. The architecture mixes Baroque design, an imposing dome, and multicolored marble; also offers views from the terrace over the city. It contains tombs of many important Portuguese figures.

Igreja Santa Maria De Belém Although Igreja Santa Maria de Belém is part of the Jerónimos Monastery complex, it has a separate entrance and is free to enter. Like the monastery, construction started in 1501 and it was designed to be a spiritual refuge for sailors and explorers before they set off on their journeys. There are a lot of things to see inside the church but make sure you don't miss the tombs of Vasco da Gama and Luís de Camões.

Igreja de Santa Catarina I almost missed Igreja de Santa Catarina the first time because it doesn't have an obviously grand facade on this main street, but the interior is incredible.

It's decorated in the Baroque style with lots of gold and a Rococo ceiling. One of the most important elements is the monumental organ which is a masterpiece of gilded woodwork.

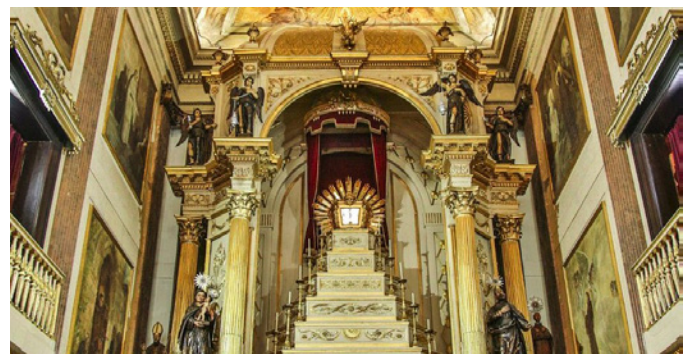

Igreja dos Anjos (Church of Our Lady of the Angels)

Again, you can't judge a book by its cover! You might think Igreja dos Anjos is quite new from the exterior, which is only a hundred years old. But it was built to house a much older interior that used to be in a church that was knocked down to build a road. The gilded woodwork is from the 1600s and some of the paintings are from the 1500s. It's quite a small church within a church that doesn't get many visitors, but there's a lot of history on display.

Explore Historical Sites and Neighborhoods

Belém Tower (Torre de Belém) Iconic 16th-century fortress built to protect Lisbon's harbor. A masterpiece of Manueline architecture, it symbolizes the Age of Discoveries and offers views of the Tagus River.

Jerónimos Monastery (Mosteiro dos Jerónimos) A masterpiece of Manueline architecture, built during Portugal's Age of Discovery. The church contains the tombs of Vasco da Gama, King Manuel I, among others, elaborate stone carvings, cloisters, and adjacent museums. In Disney terms, this is a 5-Star, do-not-miss attraction.

Convento do Carmo (Carmo Convent) / Museu Arqueológico do Carmo A Gothic convent partially destroyed by the great Lisbon earthquake of 1755. Its roofless nave is striking, particularly when juxtaposed against the brilliant blue sky. The site now includes an archaeological museum with artifacts spanning Portuguese history, medieval tombs, mummies, azulejos, etc.

São Jorge Castle (Castelo de São Jorge) We didn't go on our first visit, and what a huge mistake. This place is absolutely magnificent, and the views are heart-stoppingly beautiful. It is also an excellent introduction to the city because it allows you to stand at the top and look down on all the places that you have been or will go throughout the week. Go for the views, the peacocks, and the walk up. It was originally a Moorish stronghold, later transformed into a royal palace and military post. It is included on our walking tour of Alfama.



Praça do Comércio (Commerce Square) A monumental square by the river, rebuilt after the 1755 earthquake. Once the site of the Royal Palace, it now features the Arco da Rua Augusta and elegant arcades.

Avenida da Liberdade Located about 1 mile from our Hotel, the Avenida is Lisbon's grandest and most elegant boulevard. Inspired by Paris's Champs-Élysées, this 19th-century avenue features traditional Portuguese cobblestone pavements, ornate fountains, and grand statues, small parks and wide, tree-lined streets. It is also home to luxury shops, hotels, cafés, and theaters.

Luxury shops include Louis Vuitton, Gucci, Prada, Cartier, Rolex, Burberry, Armani, Versace, as well as department stores like Fashion Clinic and Loja das Meias. If you are looking for a unique Portuguese item, try the shops by Luis Onofre (handmade shoes) and Maria João Bahia (jewelry).

Alfama District Lisbon's oldest neighborhood, full of winding alleys, Moorish architecture, Fado music, and intimate viewpoints over the city.

Baixa District This is the central neighborhood that is closest to the river. It was rebuilt after the earthquake of 1755. This neighborhood houses the capital's most iconic squares and streets. The district starts in Restauradores Square (Praça dos Restauradores) and continues up the Avenida da Liberdade, through Praça Marquês de Pombal (Marquis of Pombal Square), which is where "Modern Lisbon" begins.



Chiado The most famous streets are Rua do Carmo, which houses the ruins of a church by the same name, and Rua Garrett, in the center of Chiado. The square and its surrounding streets are full of famous cafés, theatres, and museums.

Belém Belém is the southwesternmost district of Lisbon. Belém houses the Jerónimos Monastery (Mosteiro dos Jerónimos), the Belém Tower (Torre de Belém), the Monument to the Discoveries (Padrão dos Descobrimentos), the 25 de Abril Bridge, and the National Coach Museum. Another must is the Pastéis de Belém, the original site of the Portuguese egg tart pastry.

Casino Estoril Casino Estoril, located in the seaside town of Estoril just outside Lisbon, is renowned for being the real-life inspiration behind Ian Fleming's first James Bond novel, "Casino Royale". During World War II, the casino was a glamorous refuge for aristocrats, diplomats, and intelligence agents from both Allied and Axis powers, drawn to neutral Portugal and its sophisticated nightlife. Fleming, then a British naval intelligence officer, visited Casino Estoril on a layover in 1941, observing the intrigue and high-stakes gambling between spies and exiles—a setting that influenced his iconic story of espionage and suspense.

Fleming's experience at Estoril reportedly included witnessing—and possibly joining—a dramatic baccarat game against German agents, a scene later mirrored in "Casino Royale". The casino and surrounding hotel continue to attract visitors eager to relive the thrill and mystery that birthed the legendary world of James Bond, making Casino Estoril not just a gambling destination but a historic site of intrigue and literary significance.

Casino Estoril remains one of the largest in Europe and still carries the legacy of wartime intrigue, luxurious gaming rooms, and upscale lounging areas like the intimate "Spy Bar" in the nearby Palacio Hotel, further immortalized in Bond lore. It also offers live entertaining, dining and cultural experiences, including concerts, Broadway plays, and shows.

Pink Street Located in the Cais do Sodré neighborhood, this is the hub of Lisbon's nightlife. The New York Times placed this street on its list of 12 Best Streets in Europe. The official name is Rua Nova do Carvalho.

Time Out Market Food hall featuring a smaller version of many of the top restaurants and bars in Lisbon. Mercado da Ribeira, Avenida 24 de Julho. Visit on Monday when some restaurants are closed. Seating is first come, first served, on long tables.

Miradouros, or Scenic Overlooks

Lisbon is known as the City of Seven Hills. Each hill faces the Tagus River. Each hill has a terrace from which to contemplate the beauty of the city. Called “miradouros” (viewpoints), they’re usually located at the highest points of each hill, and all have spaces to sit and rest. Some even have cafés serving snacks and light refreshments. The Tuk-Tuk tour offered in our excursions will take you to several of them.

São Jorge Castle (Castelo de São Jorge) Historic hilltop fortress with expansive views over central Lisbon and the Tagus River. Part of the castle’s charm is the miradouro built into its ramparts. It has a lovely café for a quick lunch.

Miradouro da Senhora do Monte Lisbon’s highest official viewpoint. Located in the Graça neighborhood, this miradouro offers panoramic views of the city skyline, castle, and river. Peaceful and romantic—perfect for sunset.

Miradouro da Graça (Sophia de Mello Breyner Andresen Viewpoint) This view is popular with locals. Views include the castle, downtown, and 25 de Abril Bridge. Features a café with outdoor seating and is framed by pine trees.

Miradouro de Santa Catarina (Adamastor) A relaxed spot popular with young locals and street performers. Overlooks the river, the port, and the bridge. Named after the mythological figure Adamastor.

Miradouro de São Pedro de Alcântara Beautifully landscaped terrace with a panoramic view over the Baixa, the castle, and the Alfama district. Includes a detailed tile map showing what you’re looking at.

Miradouro das Portas do Sol Iconic view of Alfama’s terracotta rooftops, churches, and the Tagus. It’s one of the most photographed spots in Lisbon—perfect at golden hour.

Miradouro de Santa Luzia Right next to Portas do Sol, this charming miradouro features bougainvillea-covered pergolas, azulejos (blue tiles), and a romantic garden setting.

Miradouro do Parque Eduardo VII Located at the top of Lisbon’s central park. Offers a long, dramatic view down the avenue toward the river and Praça do Comércio.

Miradouro do Recolhimento A lesser-known, quiet viewpoint with shaded benches and gardens. Offers a framed perspective of Alfama and the river—a hidden gem.

Miradouro do Monte Agudo Lesser-known among tourists but popular with locals. Stunning views from the east side of the city, great for sunrise or peaceful late afternoons.

Miradouro da Penha de França Higher and further from the city center, but offers unobstructed views over eastern Lisbon. Quiet and authentic.



Explore with Your Children



Oceanarium de Lisboa Europe's largest indoor aquarium is the Lisbon Oceanarium. Located in the modern Parque das Nações district, this oceanarium has been repeatedly hailed as the "world's best aquarium," home to over 500 species from playful sea otters to intimidating sharks.

Pavilhão do Conhecimento Just a short stroll from the Oceanarium is the Knowledge Pavilion, Lisbon's interactive science museum. This is a science playground where kids (and parents!) can conduct fun experiments and play with exhibits that seamlessly blend education with entertainment.

Parque das Nações The Parque das Nações waterfront (where the Oceanarium is) offers a long, flat promenade along the Tagus River. Rent bicycles or just stroll, enjoying public art and playgrounds dotted along the way. This area was built for the World Expo '98 and is super family-friendly—wide open spaces and gardens.

Electricity and Art at the MAAT (Tejo Power Station) For a unique museum experience, you can also head to Belém's MAAT—part contemporary art gallery, part historic power station—housed in a former thermoelectric plant. Here even the building is an adventure: massive boilers and steam machinery will fascinate young visitors, and interactive stations let kids experiment with electrical phenomena in a hands-on way.

Conquer Castelo de São Jorge A medieval fortress perched above the city. Your little knights and princesses can roam the ramparts, peer through battlements, and imagine epic battles in this centuries-old castle. The hilltop views are stunning for parents (a perfect family photo op with red rooftops and the river in the background), and kids will love exploring the nooks and crannies and spotting peacocks that strut around the castle grounds.



Meet the Animals at the Lisbon Zoo Jardim Zoológico de Lisboa, the city's historic zoo, is a must-visit for animal-loving families and is a short 5-minute walk from our convention hotel. It is like a lush escape filled with wildlife. Here your kids can come face-to-face with lions, giraffes, monkeys, and more than 300 species, but the real show-stopper is the dolphin presentation at Dolphin Bay, an hour-long show where bottlenose dolphins and sea lions splash and awe the crowd. The zoo also features a few mini-adventures within a 20-minute cable car ride that soars above the animal habitats for a bird's-eye view of elephants and rhinos below, and a little train that circles the park. These extra rides break up the walking and add thrills for the kids (who doesn't love gliding over a tiger enclosure?).

Beach Time and Day Trips Though Lisbon proper doesn't have beaches, a short train or car ride brings you to fabulous coastlines. A popular choice for families is Cascais or Carcavelos Beach, about 30 minutes away, where you'll find sandy beaches and gentle waves ideal for kids to splash in.



Amphibious Fun with Hippotrip For something completely different, how about touring Lisbon in a bus that turns into a boat? Hippotrip is a quirky land-and-water adventure where you board a colorful amphibious vehicle near Doca de Santo Amaro, sing along with energetic guides, then splash straight into the Tagus River. Kids' jaws will drop when this "bus" becomes a boat—it's the ultimate surprise.

Kidzania A massive hit for kids ages 3 to 14. It's a mini city run by kids—an indoor theme park where children try out over 60 different professions in realistic settings. They can become a doctor, firefighter, pilot, chef, or even a TV presenter for an hour, earning "money" (Kidzos) for their work and then spending it on fun activities. Imagine toddlers driving little cars on kid-sized streets while older ones fight "fires" with real water hoses or perform surgery in a pretend hospital.

Quantum Park Another fantastic indoor outlet for energy is Quantum Park, Lisbon's trampoline and climbing arena. If it's raining or the kids have the wiggles, this place has you covered with wall-to-wall trampolines (including a free jump area just for toddlers under 3), a ninja-warrior style obstacle course, foam pits, and climbing walls.



Parque Eduardo VII Located an easy 10-minute walk from the Corinthia, Lisbon's largest central park offers panoramic views of the city and the Tagus River. At the top of the garden, visit the Estufa Fria, a vast greenhouse with exotic plants.

Tapada das Necessidades A lesser-known treasure with a romantic, slightly wild feel. Features a historic fountain and is ideal for a peaceful retreat.

Jardim Botânico da Ajuda Created in 1768, this garden was the first botanical garden in Portugal, displaying a diverse range of plant species.
