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#1 CCS Room Block is Full...but the Hotel Still Has Rooms Available!





#3 Opening Statements

Mediation took hold in the late 1980's and early 1990's, and thereafter radically changed the landscape of litigation in America forever. In the early days of mediation, lawyers presented an opening statement, which looked like...well, an opening statement. Lawyers carted in overhead projectors along with boxes full of transparencies, ("of what?" you may be asking) poster boards and easels, all while dressed in formal courtroom attire.

Mediation openings typically went on far longer than opening statements presented in court, so, it could take a while. Reflecting on my early days as a lawyer, my mentors emphasized the importance of addressing opposing parties directly during mediations. Not the mediator or lawyer, but to look the opposing party directly in the eye and state exactly what you think of their case and what you intended to do if it didn't settle. This tactic led to a few tense mediation moments.

There was one time a P.I. Plaintiff and her lawyer did not take it well when, as a young lawyer, I looked the Plaintiff in the eyes and said, "I don't think you are hurt at all! And if we do not settle this case today, I am going to put you under surveillance all the way to the trial," (admittedly a punkish move).

Higher capacity silicon-anode lithium-ion batteries make data-driven insights more important than ever.

The world is demanding more powerful, longer-lasting batteries for electronics and vehicles. Many new battery technologies and chemistries are rising to the challenge, from sodium-ion to solid state to lithium-ion batteries with silicon anodes — the market for which is [projected to grow by more than 60%](#) over the next 10 years.

The momentum behind silicon-anode batteries is in large part driven by their ability to store more energy than lithium-ion batteries of equivalent mass and volume. However, their increased energy density could also pose new, different, and potentially more dangerous risks in the event of a failure.

While many startup companies and major manufacturers are ramping up silicon anode production, ensuring these batteries can hold up to real-world use is paramount.

Gaining and maintaining market share for this emerging technology will take special focus on developing effective safety, reliability, and long-term performance testing.

The presentation will discuss the recent decision from the U.S. District Court in Texas striking down the FTC's ban on non-compete provisions, but more importantly, it will discuss other recent court decisions that have not made national news. Brian will review the recent Ohio decision in which the Court granted a motion for a preliminary injunction—and prohibited a national accounting/wealth management firm from enforcing its non-compete and non-solicitation agreement with a former equity partner.
